## If I Win \$15 Billion, Here's Exactly What I'll Do With It—And Why This Fight Was Never Just About Me

People ask me all the time:

"What are you going to do with the money?"

It's a fair question. When you hear someone is fighting a \$15 billion case, you expect ego, greed, and maybe a private island. But that's not what this is. And it never has been.

Because I've been on the other side.

I've had nothing.

I've felt what it's like to be broke, unheard, ignored, and forgotten by the system. I've lived in the margins, of healthcare, of justice, of society. I know what it's like to be sick with no care, to be criminalized instead of helped, and to have no one show up for you.

And when you've lived through that kind of pain, you start to see the cracks in everything around you. And you realize: the only way out isn't just survival. It's rebuilding everything they've broken.

## This Case Is Bigger Than Me

This isn't just about fraud.

It's about what happens when you try to tell the truth and no one wants to hear it.

I contacted over 50 attorneys.

Each one of them told me I was wrong.

Not because I didn't have evidence, but because they didn't want to touch the truth.

One attorney even threatened me with jail.

She got aggressive, angry, because I was trying to show him what I'd uncovered. Because I dared to say: "Look at this. Isn't this illegal?"

That's what happens when you step outside the box they built for us.

This case is about every attorney I've ever trusted in my life, during the hardest moments, who promised to fight for justice and then never cared.

It's about the legal system itself, where procedure matters more than people, where profit matters more than truth, and where you have to learn an entirely different language just to stand up for yourself.

## Think about that:

You literally have to go to school for years, spend six figures, and pass an exam, just to earn permission to fight for someone else.

But the moment you try to fight for yourself?

You're mocked. You're underestimated. You're called foolish.

And that's by design.

They don't want us to believe we can challenge the system.

They want us to stay in our lanes.

We're trained to think: "I'm just a nurse." "I'm just a construction worker." "I'm not a lawyer, what do I know?"

But I'm telling you right now: we can learn this.

I'm not special.

I've just lived through so much bullshit, so many betrayals, so many systems that failed me—over and over, that I had no choice but to study this.

And yes, I'm going up against some of the best attorneys in the country, and I see the truth:

They are trained to play games.

Not to find truth. Not to seek justice. But to protect their clients using loopholes, delays, shell structures, jurisdiction arguments, and procedural traps.

And they get paid thousands of dollars a day to do it.

This case is bigger than me because it exposes how normal this has become.

How law has turned into strategy.

How justice has become a business.

And I'm still standing. Alone. Pro se. With the truth.
