The Foundations That Weren't What They Seemed

This was the part that shook me. Charitable foundations. Nonprofits.

Being used as mailing fronts for for-profit product companies.

Let me say that again:

The people making money off the products I was selling were routing their mail, and possibly their operations, through nonprofit foundations. That's not just unethical. That's fraud-adjacent.

It's the kind of thing the IRS, DOJ, and SEC go after, when they're paying attention.
